6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

The two best practices of decentralisation and participative management carried out during the last year include—

i. Decentralisation: Practicing decentralization in governance, the University created various levels in academics and administration. As one such initiative, the University established Institutional Innovation Council (IIC) on 29th Oct. 2018 as a high-power body to strategize innovative practices in academics, research, entrepreneurship, and skill development. This Council comprises senior professors, industry representatives, innovators and other stakeholders from different spheres to initiate the innovative activities and to motivate the students. The Council will organize workshops and seminars where entrepreneurs, investors and professionals will deliberate upon the advanced innovations in various areas. It will also identify and reward the innovators on the basis of their contribution in devising innovative techniques and products which may help the young entrepreneurs in establishing their startups. The focus of the IIC is to promote innovation in the University through multitudinous modes leading to an innovative eco-system in the campus. It will function in tandem with MHRD Innovation Cell (MIC) and Centre for Innovation skill and Entrepreneurship Development (CISED) of Central University of Haryana. Similarly, the University delegated the financial power to various officers vide notification no. CUH/2019/Fin./565 dated 16th January 2019.

ii. Participative Management: Believing in democratic ethos, the University practices participative

management strategies in day to day administration where all the major decisions are taken in consultation with the important stakeholders— students, teachers and staff. This year, the University introduced some of the best practices like encouraging the young faculty for developing MOOCs; discouraging the use of plastic bottles in campus; speed-limit of 30Kms/h in campus; egovernance; and promotion of digital transactions, after detailed discussions in the meetings chaired by the Vice Chancellor. The University administration has been structured in a way that all the officers/officials get inseparably integrated in the structure.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

- 6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (with in 100 words each):
 - ❖ Curriculum Development: The University pursues the vision of quality higher education by providing the best of learning opportunities to the students where curriculum forms the fulcrum of the teaching-learning activities. The curriculum of all the programmes of study is built on high expectations, aligned with creative and critical thinking. It emphasizes relevance of information, innovative pedagogies, problem solving strategies, enabling the students to apply reasoning to justify their thinking, suiting diverse needs of student community. It is developed through a collaborative approach where students, faculty and subject-experts participate in the exercise of devising a standard curriculum. The curriculum is guided by the principles of relevance, validity, joyfulness and rigorosity.
 - ❖ Teaching and Learning: Remaining conscious of the fact that pedagogical practices determine the learning experiences and influence the learning outcomes, the university adopts quality improvement strategies in teaching-learning process through innovative pedagogies and engaging learning environment to ensure holistic development of students. The teaching-learning strategies are revisited and syllabus is revised at regular intervals to maintain and sustain the interest of the learners. The students are trained not only in the domain of their subject but they are also given opportunities to develop multidisciplinary understanding through Choice-based Credit System wherein the students have the liberty to choose the general elective courses of their choices.
 - ❖ Examination and Evaluation: The examination and evaluation system of the University focuses on continuous and comprehensive evaluation where the students are awarded with CGPA and SGPA on the basis of their performance in sessional tests, term-end examinations, attendance and classroom participation. In case of Postgraduate programmes, there is weightage of 70 and 30

percent for term-end examinations and internal assessment, respectively, while in case of research programmes, the weightage for term-end exams and internal assessment is in the ratio of 60:40. The University has streamlined the examination and evaluation process by adopting separate ordinances for each level of academic programmes— UG, PG and research programmes. As one of the best practices, the university declares the results of term-end examinations within 15 days.

- ❖ Research and Development: Some of the important quality improvement strategies pursued by the University in research and development include—adoption of UGC (Minimum Standards and Procedure for Award of M.Phil./Ph.D Degrees) Regulations, 2016 and UGC (Promotion of Academic Integrity and Prevention of Plagiarism in Higher Educational Institutions) Regulations, 2018; admissions in research programmes through Central Universities Common Entrance Test (CUCET); Annual Best Researcher Award for Faculty; provision of minimum residency period of two years for Ph.D programme; and zero tolerance against plagiarism and intellectual theft. The University provides financial assistance, in the form of Non-NET Fellowship, to all the research scholars who are not covered under Junior Research Fellowship.
- **Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation:** The fully automated and Wi-Fi enabled central library accommodated in new academic block has fully air-conditioned rooms. The premises is equipped with CCTV cameras. It has reading hall and e-Library for 70 Students, Faculty & Researchers. Readers may enjoy reading newspapers, magazines competitive books at periodical section of the library. The operations at circulation counter are automated with egranthalaya and KOHA Library Management Software supported with Barcode enabled Issue -Return of books. It offers online library catalogue to check availability of books online, hold books online, check dues on their account, make list of their favourite books etc. The Library is visible through its Website. The library services & resources are used by library members through its Online Library User Track System. It has developed institutional repository on Dspace. It provides Inter-Library Loan service through DELNET. Plagiarism is checked through Urkund and Turnitin plagiarism software in the library. 32 educational channels are shown in the library through Swayam Prabha platform. The Library has created instance of Indian Research Information Network System, an expert database of whole university. It offers facility of latest software for physically disabled students. It opts for online procedure for registering book vendors to supply books to university library. The Library promotes both open access e-resources by offering access to the National Digital Library of India, NPTEL, and Swayam and subscribed print & online journals.

In addition to quality improvement strategies in library services, the University has created the

facility of five Virtual classrooms to facilitate the development and recording of e-contents.

- ❖ Human Resource Management: Pursuing the best practices in governance, the University believes in transparency, objectivity and democratic outlook while dealing with the issues relating to human resources. There is a well-organised structure of human resources either defined by the statutes or ordinances of the university, and in recent past, the University implemented Bio-metric attendance system for non-teaching employees as a step ahead towards streamlining the HRM. Similarly, the University has devised the well-defined mechanism for redressing the grievances of students, non-teaching employees and teachers. Ordinance XXVI of the University provides grievances redressal mechanism. The university has also notified the list of empaneled hospitals vide notification no. CUH/2019/Estt. Sec./NT/188 dated 28th Aug. 2019 for the benefit of the employees and their dependents.
- **❖** Industry **Interaction Collaboration:** Focusing the importance **Industry** Interaction/Collaboration in curriculum designing, training and placement, the University has entered into collaboration with industry partners and sector skill council, particularly for designing of professional courses and training of B.Vocational students. In the last one year, the University signed MoUs with Deshwal Waste Management Pvt. Ltd; and Hitech Enviro Engineers and Consultants Pvt. Ltd. for Curriculum Design, Industrial Training & Visits, Research and Development in the field of Electrical and Electronic Waste Management and Wastewater Treatment. Industry experts have also been nominated in the BoS of various departments offering professional courses for having relevant inputs on industry skills required to be imparted to students.
- ❖ Admission of Students: The University now offers 60 programmes of study under 33 departments and 11 Schools of Study with enrolment of more than 2600 students. Besides, the University Grants Commission has granted the permission for introduction of three new academic programmes, namely LL.B, M.Pharma and M.P.Ed.

The University offers admission through Central Universities Common Entrance Test. With quality parameters for admission process in place, at the age of 10, the Central University of Haryana now boasts of being NAAC accredited Grade 'A' university, having more than 40 % students from 25 different states other than Haryana. Also, the University has always been successful in maintaining encouraging enrolment of female students and there is constant increase in the number of female students. The University's focus on promotion of diversity, inclusivity and outreach gets and testified through the NIRF score of 56.18 in "Outreach and Inclusivity" parameter in NIRF

Ranking-2019.

6.2.2 : Implementation of e-governance in areas of operations:

- ❖ Planning and Development: The University has implemented e-governance in all spheres of planning and development. All the tenders are floated on University website and the University procures the required items from Government E-Marketplace (GeM), if available.
- ❖ Administration: All the administrative transactions are carried out through e-governance practices. The e-governance practices in administration include— dynamic website, online applications for recruitment, disclosure of all relevant information (Statute, Ordinances, Academic and Administrative Structure, notifications, media reports, events, office orders and circulars, and facilities) on University website, and optimum implementation of e-governance strategies to reduce the use of paper.
- ❖ Finance and Accounts: Implementing e-governance in the areas of financial operations, the University has adopted Expenditure, Advance and Transfer (EAT) Module and Public Financial Management System (PFMS) on the directions of Ministries of Finance and Human Resource Development. Besides, the University practices 100% digital transactions.
- ❖ Student Admission and Support: The University offers online admissions and counselling are also held online, and all the student-support facilities are displayed on university website. The students can access all relevant information and facilities online by visiting the university website.
- ❖ Examination: Starting from the registration to examination, all the processes are carried out in 'online' format. The students can access their results from University website and can download their degrees from National Academic Depository (NAD) platform.

The Central University of Haryana has Internal as well as External Financial Audit regulatory system as per the laid down financial guidelines of UGC and Government of India. The University has in principle an effective Internal Audit system ensuring in implementing the reliability of financial reporting, safeguarding the assets and compliance of the laid down rules and regulations. Internal Audit ensures accomplishing financial objectives i.e. proper utilization of funds/grants within the framework of university Statutes/ordinances and GFR/other Government rules. Internal Audit has not only fortified the procedures but also helps in improving the transparent functioning.

The University's External Financial Audit is under the Purview of the Comptroller and Auditor General of

India. All the Financial Accounts of the University including transaction vouchers and balance sheet are audited by the CAG team annually spreading over a span of 15 days each and total a month. Observations, if any, brought out by the Internal and External Audit in improving the financial transactions are taken care of and implemented according to the satisfaction of the audit, by the administration forthwith and also shown to the next audit for dropping the observations.

Higher education institutions are the focal point of knowledge, which make a great contribution to the growth and development of a country through fostering innovation and improving the skill and knowledge. These institutions play a leading role to improve the quality of life on educating the stakeholders and addressing major social and global problems. In the same pace, the University is also conscious towards environmental and climate change. The University has taken effective steps in improving and maintaining the eco-friendly environment in and around the campus. Some of the major initiatives taken by the university during the year include:

• Various programmes have been organized within the campus and in the adopted villages through outreach activities to sensitize the people about environment conservation and management. The Eco Club has organized "Special Lecture on Water Conservation" by Waterman, Sh. Rajender Singh on March 28, 2019

to sensitize the students and local villagers about the conservation of waste and their resources.

- The Department of Environmental Sciences has organized "World Earth Day-2019" on the theme "Protect Our Species" to sensitise the community about accelerating rate of extinction of millions of species.
- Awareness programmes on the occasion of World Earth Day was organised by Department of Environmental Sciences in various educational institutes in the neighbourhood of the University on April 22, 2019 to make people conscious about environmental issues and to motivate them to adopt sustainable practices.
- The extension lecture was organized to highlight the importance of biodiversity and potential role of community to retain the environmental services of biodiversity. The extension lecture was delivered by Prof. S.C. Garkoti, School of Earth Sciences, Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi on April 25, 2019.
- To motivate students of the University and learn about various environmental issues, activities like poster making and quiz competition are regular features of the Department of Environmental Sciences.
- In this context, awareness campaigns were organized by Department of Environmental Science in collaboration with NSS and YRC on May 01, 2019.
- The University has banned single-use plastic in the campus, which shows the consciousness of the institute towards environmental protection. Moreover, the University does not encourage any plastic carry bags. The volunteer from various departments also conduct programs from time to time for sensitise the students about the proper disposal of plastic waste.
- The Department of Environmental Sciences has conducted awareness programme and campaign for water conservation, and optimal utilization of water supplied to their household. The campaign was organized in different schools in the surrounding areas of the University to mobilize the students and society about sustainable utilization of water.
- The University has adopted various practices to overcome the waste of resources and their sustainable utilization in the campus. Some of the measures taken are:
 - Constant supervision to switch off lights, fans and instruments in laboratories when not in use.
 - Complete shift of lighting facility in the campus through LED lights, which consume less energy.
 - Gradual replacement of CRT monitors in the computer labs in the campus by LED monitors.
 - The academic blocks are designed and constructed aesthetically which allows availability of natural light and air, so as to reduce the dependence on electrical lighting and air circulation.
 - Replacement of incandescent bulbs with tube light & CFL lights which consume less energy.
 - The instruments purchased in the labs of the institute are of 5 star rating, which certainly reduce the consumption of electricity and also helps to conserve the natural resources.
 - Circulation of information and maintenance of record of student and staff is done through paper less policy to reduce the use and wastage of papers.
 - Use of organic waste from various sources for composting.
 - The use of ramp and staircases are encouraged among the students and staff to save the electricity and to improve health of University staff and students.

- The students are encouraged to use bicycles instead of bikes or cars.
- The University has also adopted eco-friendly measures to maintain the sustainability of resources in the campus. The institute has focused on production of renewable energy through solar power to meet the requirements of the University campus to a greater extent. Some of the initiates taken at University level are mentioned below:
 - The solar power plants of 250KW is installed at the hostel building and engineering buildings of the University to meet the requirement to a huge extent.
 - o Moreover, separate units for solar power plants of 160KW were also installed at academic blocks (1, 3 & 4) to reduce the dependence on the electricity.
 - o Currently, the institute is able to meet 15-20% of the electricity requirement through renewable energy resources, which will further be enhanced to 25%, once the solar plant of academic block get operative.
 - The hostels and residential buildings of the institute are facilitated with solar heater of capacity 1000LPD and 100LPD for each flat in residential area of the campus to reduce the consumption of the electricity for heating purpose.
- The University is also conscious towards conservation of water and water resources. The institute has well defined rain water harvesting facility through which entire rain water flowing from the roof and paved roads in the campus is harvested through re-charging pit for recycling the bore well facility. The rain water harvesting system helps to maintain the ground water level in the surrounding region and sustainability of water resources.
- The University is also known for their effort for carbon neutrality and the institute contributes very little to the carbon. The traces of carbon generated from vehicular emission and diesel generator (when required) is neutralized by maintaining the trees and greenery in the campus. Potted plants and cultivated plants are also grown in possible places inside the University. Moreover, plantation drives are also organized from time to time to further enhance carbon sequestration.
- The University has also tied with waste management agencies for safer management of biomedical waste and e-waste generated from the campus. The University has also organized drives for awareness about safe disposal of electric and electronic waste and further collection of e-waste in specified and dedicated bins.

The University has taken green initiative in the campus to reduce the wastage and sustainable utilization of resources. Various activities in the campus and outreach activities has also contributed in substantial improvement in attitude of students and community towards preserving green environment.
